



Motorsports have been around for over 100 years and continue to be male-dominated. Formula Woman hopes to change that. Their mission statement is “To drive women into motorsport, a sport which has been male-dominated for over 100 years, and develop a global Formula Woman community.” The program is not just a competition but a community of like-minded women with a love for motorsport. Formula Woman is geared towards women with little or no racing experience where they have an opportunity to show their natural driving skills and potentially develop them to become a professional racing driver

The program begins with a one-time admissions fee of £99 and you can be on your way to becoming a ‘Formula Woman.’ The program encompasses a driver academy that you can participate in that includes track days with professional coaching, simulator training at iZone at Silverstone, karting instruction and racing, Lotus driving days at their factor, club-level races and sprints, overseas track instruction, and much more. For those younger than 16 (U.S.) or 17 (U.K.), there is a junior academy that includes most of the same activities besides that of actually driving a car.

The Formula Woman represents different areas of the world in national competitions each year and currently, there are seven Formula Woman drivers. The end goal for many of the drivers is to end up in one of the Formula levels, whether it is competing against F1 World Champions like Lewis Hamilton or on a smaller level such as F3.



Since the beginning of motorsports and Formula One in 1946, men have dominated the sport and while there have been women competing on the same level none have taken a title. Formula Woman hopes to continue to empower those interested in motorsports and hopefully take a title in F1 one day!
